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Early voting underway in **Upshur County** Commissioners Pct. 3 race

On July 14, Texas will hold its 2020 runoff elections to decide the final spots for Democrats and Republicans on the November general election ballot. There are 35 congressional, legislative and state board nominations up for grabs. And locally, there are two runoff races in Upshur County - Kent Abernathy is facing Michael Ashley for the Pct. 3 Commissioner seat. There is no one running on the Democratic Party side, so the winner of this runoff will be the next commissioner, replacing retiring commissioner Frank Berka. Early voting started Monday, June 29.

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Positive COVID-19 cases at city hall causes doors to close for 21 days Free testing set

Gladewater City Hall will be closed for the next three weeks to the public, following the discovery that three employees have now tested positive for COVID-19.

Gladewater Mayor J.D. Shipp said Monday access to city hall by staff will require a temperature check and a mask will be required. Access to the Police Department, Fire Department, and Public Works buildings will also require a temperature check prior to admission.

Shipp reported all surfaces within these buildings will continue to be diligently cleaned.

In a press release, city officals stated:

Over the weekend of June 26-28, three City of Gladewater employees tested positive for COVID-19. None of the employees required hospitalization but are in isolation as they recover. In the best interest of public health and welfare, we are reporting these cases ahead of official county notification. We care for our citizens and staff, so it was important to make all of you aware of this development.

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Game room permit denial upheld

The Upshur County Sheriff's Office was notified last week that the Upshur County Game Room Hearing Examiner Don Gross has upheld the Sheriff's Office denial of three game room permit applications from Harry Fox due to misleading information being provided with the application.

"After reviewing the evidence, personal testimony and video testimony presented at the June 23, 2020 hearing on The Country Store, LLC, I find the information provided in Exhibits 3 and 4 to be misleading. I am denying the appeal and uphold the ruling by the Upshur County Sheriff's Office. Thank you, Don Gross."

According to a press release from the Upshur County Sheriff's Office, Fox and his partner Randall Rudd had appealed the Sheriff's Office decision to deny their game room applications due to misleading information regarding contributions being made to area law enforcement.

The press release gos on to say, "The Sheriff's Office, knowing that the applicants had not made a donation to this office, checked with other law enforcement agencies in the area and learned that they too had not taken direct donations from the applicants as listed in the application.

"The investigation of the donations determined that the listed donations were made by the Upshur County Crime Stoppers organization, not the applicants. The applicants have donated to Upshur County Crime Stoppers, a separate organization not governed by County of Upshur officials.

"The applicants have the right to appeal the Hearing Examiner's decision to the 115 District Court within 30 days of the Examiners ruling. This week, Upshur County Sheriff's investigators will turn in a criminal case report to the District Attorney's Office for consideration of criminal charges related to the incident."

Local man indicted on drug charge

The Upshur County Grand Jury returned 37 indictments, 18 of them sealed, and no-billed three cases Thursday.

Wendell Dale Lewis, 60, of Gilmer, delivery of controlled substance (methamphetamine) in drug-free zone last Oct. 15. Although bond was set at \$10,000, he remained in county jail at Gilmer on a state "blue warrant" alleging parole violation.

Krystal Denese Nix, 40, listed as "homeless," possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) on June 10, 2019.

GISD approves budget

GISD Financial Director Glenda Hickey led a public meeting prior to the special called meeting of the school board Monday night. Hickey reviewed the proposed 2020-21 budget. She said based on preliminary information she expects the tax rate to be \$1.4497 with \$1.0547 in maintenance and operation and \$0.3950 in interest and sinking.

"We will not know until certified values are out," Hickey said. "So the tax rate adoption will fall later in July or in early August."

The proposed budget for maintenance and operation is set at \$19,305,097 with \$1,979,991 for debt service which the board approved 7-0 as the first action of the special called meeting.

The board also unanimously approved a budget amendment for \$35,000 for security resource officer salary, as well as approved contracts for Gladewater High School math teacher Christie Ernst, Special Education Inclusion Teacher Debbie **Photo by Jim Bardwell** Henderson and Agriculture Teacher Kendra Valchar.

Annual Yamboree festival canceled due to COVID-1

The annual East Texas Yamboree festival, which draws thousands to the city of Gilmer each October, and the city's annual July 3 fireworks show have been canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic--the first time in 75 years the Yamboree has been suspended.

City and Upshur County officials cited Gov. Greg Abbott's order regulating public gatherings as a factor in the decision, and County Judge Todd Tefteller and Mayor Tim Marshall issued a directive Monday (June 29) effectively canceling the 83rd holding of the festival and the fireworks show.

Tefteller said his meeting Friday with the county's COVID-19 advisory committee, Marshall, and the Yamboree board's executive committee produced "the unanimous decision by all that there is no way in the world to hold the Yamboree or 4th of July celebrations this year responsibly.'

Although the festival was not scheduled until Oct. 15-17, Tefteller said the issue of whether to hold it had to be addressed now partly because contestants for "Queen Yam" of the annual gathering were due to start their contest Monday (June 29) of selling tickets to Yamboree events.

The other factor in the decision, he said, was Abbott's order generally prohibiting "gatherings of more than 100 people without approval of local officials."

The judge wrote that his Monday order willl ban all activities on county property of 100 people or more, and "This I do with a heavy heart, but there is no other way." Tefteller added, however, that "Going forward we will address future events one on one that involve more than 100 people."

He also said Marshall would sign Monday's directive since some

Gov. order restricts bars serving alcohol

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott ordered the state to slow down the reopening process for bars and other venues as coronavirus-related infections, hospitalizations and deaths continued to increase in Texas last week.

"As I said from the start, if the positivity rate rose above 10%, the State of Texas would take further action to mitigate the spread of COVID-19," Abbott said. "At this time, it is clear that the rise in cases is largely driven by certain types of activities, including Texans congregating in bars."

Abbott ordered bars and other state-licensed establishments that receive more than 51% of their gross receipts from the sale of alcoholic beverages to close at noon on June 26, but allowed them to continue offering delivery and take-out services until further notice.

The governor allowed restaurants, beginning June 29, to remain open for dine-in service, but at a capacity not to exceed 50% of total listed indoor occupancy.

Also notably, the governor ordered rafting and tubing businesses to close and that outdoor gatherings of 100 or more people obtain the approval of local governments before the event.

While stopping short of issuing a statewide order for Texans to wear nose-and-mouth-covering masks in public, Abbott did say every Texan "has a responsibility to themselves and their loved ones to wear a mask, wash their hands, stay six feet apart from others in public and stay home if they can."

Meanwhile, after news that the Trump administration planned to cut funding for COVID-19 testing stations in Texas and other states, Abbott announced that the federal government had granted his request to extend operations of community-based testing sites across Texas. The expansion is aimed particularly at Dallas and Houston, where the spread of the deadly, influenza-like disease surged in recent days.

In related news, Abbott issued an executive order on June 25 prohibiting elective surgeries at hospitals in Bexar, Dallas, Harris and Travis counties. The order, intended to make more hospital beds available to potential influxes of COVID-19 patients, directs all hospitals in those counties to postpone surgeries and procedures that are not immediately, medically necessary.

Cumulative figures posted June 28 by the Texas Department of State Health Services showed some 148,728 COVID-19 cases reported and 2,393 confirmed deaths resulting from the disease in the Lone Star State.

Meeting methods contrast

Plans are in place for the Republican Party of Texas to hold its convention July 16-18 at the George R. Brown Convention Center in Houston. Some 6,000 delegates are expected to attend in person.

Conversely, from June 1-6 the Texas Democratic Party held its convention in fully online mode to minimize health risks related to the coronavirus pandemic.

Study: Impact of military

A study conducted by the comptroller's office estimates that military installations in Texas contributed at least \$123 billion to the state economy in 2019 and supported more than 630,000 direct and indirect jobs.

In a June 22 joint news release with the governor's office, Comptroller Glenn Hegar said the military's impact on the state economy "can be felt by every Texan."

Gov. Abbott said, "Now more than ever, these jobs add critical stability for communities focused on economic recovery following the COVID-19 pandemic."

Military installations listed in the news release include:

Dyess Air Force Base, Abilene; U.S. Army Futures Command, Austin; Corpus Christi Army Depot; Corpus Christi Naval Air Station; Laughlin Air Force Base, Del Rio; Fort Bliss, El Paso; Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base; and Ellington Field, Houston.

Also, Fort Hood, Killeen; Naval Air Station Kingsville; Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo; Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston-Lackland Air Force Base-Randolph Air Force Base; Red River Army Depot, Texarkana; and Sheppard Air Force Base, Wichita

Paxton cheers SCOTUS

A request by the Texas Democratic party and other plaintiffs to have a San Antonio U.S. district court ruling reinstated that would allow all registered voters to vote by mail instead of in person was denied June 26 by U.S. Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito.

The action leaves in place an order issued by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit, blocking the lower court ruling. "Universal mail-in ballots, which are notoriously vulnerable to fraud, would only lead to greater election fraud and disenfranchise lawful voters," Paxton said.

Q - With the recent COVID-19 Pandemic, the County will be facing an uncertain financial future with unemployment up and some businesses closing their doors. How do you think the County can address the many immediate needs while not over-taxing local property owners?

- WE are definitely facing some difficult uncertain times ahead that none of us have ever been through before. My stance as a Commissioner would be to take another look at the budget at hand. We have to go over and dissect that Budget line item at a time in each and every Department. It is time to really tighten up the purse strings. WE as Commissioners and Dept Hec1ds have to decide on what are the real WANTS and what are the real NEEDS and that is what we need to get down to on the Budget if has not already been done. We need to have a hiring freeze until things get economically better and really look at every position when someone retires to see if we can replace_ the employee from within. Next, we need to work on promoting and bringing in new Businesses to the County. Every Penny in sales tax dollars is a benefit to the taxpayers and the budget. There is a current Business Acquisition going on now that should help with this and also help build the tax roll in the near future. This kind of Economic Development is what prosper. We have to do this in

every community within the County.

ASHLEY

A - I have never voted for a tax increase and I will not vote for one during these difficult times we are living in. My main focus will be on the immediate needs of the county and its employees. I will work with the court to remove any unnecessary spending. I will seek all state and federal emergency funding for employers, businesses, and our county to make sure we make it through this pandemic Our State Legislators are currently considering tapping into State Reserves to help people struggling to pay hospital bills, rent, and other essential needs. I feel strongly this needs to be done. I will encourage those who are able to donate and support our local food banks and I will also do so. I am so proud that there are those in our communities that check on our most vulnerable, our elderly. I will work with these individuals and do anything I can to make sure no one is forgotten. I will be visible and available to all citizens in Pct. 3.

Q - Roads -everyone wants Upshur County roads to be better. How will you address the need to improve the Upshur County road system?

ABERNATHY

A - As stated in my February reply to this same questionthis is the hottest topic and for good reason since it is the biggest line item on the budget. The Commissioners have to work with the Road and Bridge Engineer. We have to make an inventory of all the roads in each Pct. Which ones are for minor repair and major repair, etc. Then we all have a workshop and discuss and come up with a plan on the 700 plus miles of road in the county. My belief is you handle the ones that the buses carrying our precious children on first and then move from there on safety related problems. You have to do so many roads per year and the plan should at least include 2,5, and 10 year goals. Without jeopardizing safety-the money spent on roads should be allocated across the Precincts fairly.

ASHLEY

A - The biggest problems with our roads in my opinion are overloaded trucks. With the good can come the bad. These roads simply were not built for such heavy loads. Our only options are taxes and donations, so additional funding is essential. All state funding available from TxDOT's County Transportation Infrastructure Grant Program should be utilized. I will seek all revenues of assistance available. I will seek a more permanent remedy for our roads. It will cost more at first, but will last longer thus costing less in the long run. we all need to help the County I will start with the roads in greatest need and continue until

completion. This will require patience from the citizens of our precinct, but will be a lot better than what we are doing now. I will make sure there is a maintenance program in place that includes cleaning ditches for proper drainage and trimming foliage away from our roads. I will be proactive instead of reactive in all I do. Just about all of our revenue from gas and oil taxes goes to a Rainy Day Fund, Very little of this money goes to the County to use for road repair and maintenance. This needs to be changed.

Q - Finally - why should Pct. 3 Upshur County residents cast their vote for you? What sets you apart from your opponent?

ABERNATHY

A - Looking back since November 2019 when I signed my Application to run for County Commissioner, I have given it my all. We have had countless Forums, speeches, Facebook post, and newspaper articles. meetings

Freeman said police have been using video from residential doorbells and security cameras to get a clear description of suspects and he encourages everyone to invest in some type of security system both for home and business.

And when you do get a home or business camera system please let the Gladewater PD know.

"When bad things happen in Gladewater we would like to be able to reach out to you and check for footage if it's in your area," the GPD stated on its Facebook Page. "You can email us at info@gladewaterpd. com or call 903-845-2166 to let us know you have cameras and how to get in touch with you. Your information will only be used if needed in the future so we can reach out to you."

Freeman said most burglaries can be prevented by simply "locking your car doors" or investing in better locks at your homes and businesses.

"Most of the vehicle burglaries we have been seeing are where people left their vehicles unlocked or their windows were left down," Freeman advised. "And many people have their homes protected by just a thin piece of wood," which allows burglaries to easily kick in inexpensive door locks.

Here are a few tips to safeguard you home, business and vehicle.

Prevention Techniques for vehicles:

Lock Your Doors - A majority of car break-ins and thefts are from unlocked cars. Even if you are parked in front of your house, in your driveway or inside your garage, lock your doors. Criminals like to walk down the street and see if a car is unlocked, if it is they open the door and take whatever is visible and move on to the next target. However, if the door is locked, they are more likely to move on.

Secure Your Vehicle - Roll your car windows up all the way and engage the car alarm, but do not depend on it as the only way to deter a thief. A car thief can break into your car and be out in about 30 seconds, fast enough that an alarm doesn't scare most of them away.

Park Smart - Park in a busy, well-lit area and avoid concealment from larger vehicles, fences, or foliage. Avoid parking in isolated and poorly-lit areas.

Prevention Techniques for stores:

As a retail store owner, few things can be more damaging to your business than a burglary. Here are a few tactics that can help boost your security.

<u>Install an Alarm System</u> - When it comes to burglary, it is hard to beat the protection offered by a professionally-installed burglary system. Most alarm systems have multiple pieces of equipment that can alert you to an unwanted intrusion and help you notify authorities before it is too late.

<u>Install a Video Surveillance System</u> - A CCTV system will allow you to detect and record any unwanted entry to your facility, record a burglar's actions inside your facility, and may even help you visually identify the culprit, which can aid the police in finding and convicting them.
