

Bears slam Lions 61-16, host Rabbits

The Gladewater Bears jumped out to a 35-6 1st Quarter lead and then cruised their way to a 61-16 victory Friday night in New Boston's Lion Stadium.

After racking up several team records through the air last Friday night, the Bears did the majority of their damage against New Boston

on the ground. Gladewater, who is averaging 207 yards a game rushing, used their "ground and pound" attack to pile up 319 yards on 32 carries and 6 touchdowns. Leading the way for the Bears was Sr RB Eligia Carter who ran for 131 vards on 7 carries while scoring 2 touchdowns, including a 72 yard barn burner. Not to be outdone, Jr RB Devon Walker pounded his way for 3 scores on 6 carries. Soph Kolin Lewis, who took over at the QB position in the 2nd half, scored on a 7 yard TD run in the 4th Quarter. Lewis was also on the receiving end of a 34 yard TD pass from QB Tristan Holmes to give Gladewater a 42-6 halftime lead.

Gladewater's "Special Teams", who have shown out

all year, came up big once again. In the 1st Quarter Lewis recovered a Bear onside kick that led to Gladewater's 2nd score of the night and a 14-0 Bear lead. On New Boston's next possession, Sr Nick Lincoln broke through the New Boston line to block a Lion punt and teammate Eli Kates scooped up the loose ball and ran 38 yards to paydirt. Gladewater got another "Special Teams" touchdown when K'Havia Reese took a New Boston onside kick 54 yards to the house that ended the 1st Quarter and gave the Bears a 35-6 lead.

The Bear defense played big all night, causing 3 turnovers. Lincoln intercepted his 1st pass of the year and Kates and Austin Verner recovered Lion fumbles.

Gladewater will host the (1-5, 1-1) Atlanta Rabbits Friday night, October 9th at Jack V Murphy "Bear" Stadium. Game time is 7:30pm. The Rabbits are coming off a 28-14 win over Sabine, after dropping their first 5 games of the year. The Bears are looking to stay undefeated in District 6 3A D1 and atop the standings pursuing the District crown and the coveted #1 seed in the Texas High School playoffs.

County COVID cases climb to 401

The number of state-confirmed COVID-19 cases in Upshur County has now reached 401, but county officials are still trying to clarify conflicting reports from the state on the number of deaths from the disease, county Emergency Management Coordinator Marc Nichols said Monday.

While the Texas Department of State Health Services website lists 10 deaths, the agency tells him in its telephone updates that the number is three, Nichols said.


He added that he had received an email address for the state health coordinator "that I have reached out to" to clear up the discrepancy.

Nichols also said Upshur is not the only county "having the issue of getting accurate information" from the state health department.

He made that observation in a phone interview after issuing a news release saying local officials received information that 350 of the 401 persons stricken have recovered, and that there are 48 active cases besides the three deaths. County Extension Agent Julie York, a member of the county's COVID advisory committee, issued the release on Nichols' behalf.

When York informed the Upshur County Commissioners Court at its meeting on Wednesday of last week that the state listed three deaths, but was working with Nichols to update that total, County Judge Todd Tefteller said the state was "behind the curve" as "we know we have 10."

Tefteller also said county officials have known for a month the amount was more than three.

'Texas in my Rearview Mirror'

Texas lost one of its brightest country stars when singer-songwriter Mac Davis died at age 78 of complications from heart surgery.

Born and raised in Lubbock, Davis was known most for his country/ pop songs of the 1970s, including "Baby Don't Get Hooked on Me," and for writing a number of Elvis Presley hits, including "Don't Cry Daddy," "In the Ghetto" and "A Little Less Conversation." Davis also had a successful acting career, starring in his own variety show and the movie "North Dallas Forty."

The address for the West Texas Walk of Fame is 1501 Mac Davis Lane in Lubbock, which he sang about in "Texas in my Rearview Mirror."

"Many hearts are broken today, including my own, with the death of one of my dearest friends, Mac Davis," country legend Dolly Parton tweeted. "We lost one of the world's greatest writers, singers and entertainers."

A date for Davis' funeral is pending, In keeping with the last line of "Rearview Mirror," his wife said he will be buried in Lubbock in his jeans.

Irving company pivots to green energy

Vistra, an energy powerhouse based in Irving, announced plans to achieve net-zero carbon dioxide emissions by 2050.

A key part of that plan is a capital investment of \$1.15 billion by 2022 on solar and storage projects in California and Texas. The company also plans to close coal-fire energy plants in Illinois and Ohio by 2027.

"Vistra's commitment to our transformation to a low-to-no-carbon future is unequivocal and offers unique opportunities for growth and innovation," President and CEO Curt Morgan said in a press release.

Vistra solar projects opening within the next two years in Texas are in Andrews, Brightside, Emerald Grove, Forest Grove and Oak Hill. A solar project and energy storage project is planned at Upton 2 near Emerald Grove. Energy storage is planned in DeCordova southwest of Dallas-Fort Worth.

Vistra is a Fortune 275 retail electricity and power generation company. Its holdings include TXU Energy, Homefield Energy, Dynegy, Ambit Energy and Luminant.

Early voting starts Oct. 13

Gov. Greg Abbott's executive order and a Texas Supreme Court decision changed some counties' plans for handling mail-in ballots for the Nov. 3 election.

Citing security concerns, Abbott ordered all 254 Texas counties to offer only one drop-off location for absentee ballots.

"These enhanced security protocols will ensure greater transparency and will help stop attempts at illegal voting," Abbott said.

Democrats accused the Republican governor of trying to suppress the vote, particularly in larger metropolitan areas. The League of United Latin American Citizens, the League of Women Voters and two individuals filed a lawsuit to challenge the order.

"Geographically, Harris County is larger than the entire state of Rhode Island," Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo said. "Our population rivals that of the entire state of Colorado. To propose only a single, secure drop-off location for a county of our size during a pandemic is

Earlier, the Republican-controlled Texas Supreme Court issued a ruling that created a similar partisan reaction about voting security and rights. The court said Harris and other counties could not send unsolicited mail-in ballots to voters.

In-person early voting starts Oct. 13 in Texas. The Texas Library Association is encouraging its member libraries to share election guides created by the League of Women Voters.

Early voting runs until Oct. 30. The deadline to apply for a mail-in ballot is Oct. 23, and the deadline to return a mail-in ballot is Nov. 3.

Along with visiting their local libraries and reading their local newspapers, people may go to the League's vote411.org for information about their ballots for the general election. Also, the Texas Tribune, a statewide nonprofit news initiative, offers ballot information at TexasTribune.com.



Jerry Jeff is struggling with illness and age, but his music has brought a lot of joy to my life, including the fact that my smart aleck son sends me Jerry Jeff's "Redneck Mother" nearly every year for my birthday. And that goofy song makes me laugh every single time. And, more importantly it connects me with my son who has a bizarro sense of humor much like his Mom's.

So today, my cowgirl hat is tipped to great music by one of the great Cosmic Cowboy outlaws, for the laughter and joy that he has brought in one way or another to legions of fans. And, after all these years Jerry Jeff's songs still make me laugh, still make me want to dance and still teach me life lessons. Viva Terlingua old pal of my music loving soul! Electionomics

The state of the economy is inevitably a central issue in presidential campaigns, debates, and elections. This



year will likely be even more intense than usual, with the fallout from the pandemic causing millions of Americans to lose their jobs,

their savings, and, in many instances, their businesses. The best candidate to deal with the situation will be the subject of strong opinions and disagreements. During elections, economics becomes "electionomics," with rhetoric often far overshadowing reality.

The perceptions of voters regarding who will do a better job in managing the economy can sway elections. For example, in 1992, the phrase "It's the economy, stupid," coined by campaign strategist James Carville, helped shape the messaging that led to Bill Clinton's victory.

Historical studies indicate that the economy typically grows at faster rates under Democratic presidents. The difference is not large, but it is statistically significant. Drawing any conclusions from the data is, at best, a complex undertaking. Most policy changes involve lag times, and current performance can be due to actions taken during prior administrations. Some presidents inherit structural problems, and others implement policies that only bear fruit down the road. It's possible to stimulate the economy in the short term but cause long-term harm. (I have been around long enough to witness all of these things.) The bottom line is that trying to give a president substantial credit or blame for the economy is almost always oversimplifying.

Moreover, there is a limit to what a president can do to change economic patterns. Major initiatives, such as tax law changes or infrastructure overhauls, fall largely to Congress. The president exerts influence and can issue Executive Orders in certain situations, but the range of those that can survive legal scrutiny is limited. Our analysis and that of several others estimate growth in overall output and jobs would be higher under the "Biden" plan than the "Trump" plan (neither is defined with the precision necessary for




WILLIAM MAX HART

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


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Know the difference between cold, flu and COVID-19

(Flu) and COVID-19 are all contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses. COVID-19 is caused by infection with a new coronavirus (called SARS-CoV-2) and flu is caused by infection with influenza viruses.

Because some of the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone; testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis. The Flu, COVID-19 and the common cold all share many characteristics, but there are some key differences between

Difference between the flu & the common cold?

In general, the flu is worse than the common cold, and symptoms are more common and intense. It can be difficult (or even impossible) to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone. Special tests are needed, usually within the first few days of illness to determine if a person has the flu.

What are some similarities & differences between the flu & COVID-19?

Both COVID-19 and a flu can have varying degrees of signs and symptoms, ranging from no

The common cold, Influenza symptoms (asymptomatic) to severe symptoms.

Common symptoms of

- COVID-19 and flu include * Fever or feeling feverish/
 - * Cough
- * Shortness of breath or
- difficulty breathing
- * Fatigue (tiredness) * Sore throat Runny or stuffy
- * Muscle pain or body aches * Headache

Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

Other signs and symptoms of COVID-19 may include change in or loss of taste or smell.

What can I take to alleviate my symptoms?

Since there is no cure for the flu, a cold, or COVID-19, it is important to check with your healthcare provider to receive a proper diagnosis & for appropriate treatment advice.

In general, plenty of rest and drinking lots of fluids are key.

Additionally, since antibiotics don't treat a cold, the flu or COVID-19, and although treating your symptoms with over-thecounter medications (OTC) may give you some relief, you should check with your doctor first.

For example, if you have the flu, pain relievers such as aspirin, acetaminophen, or ibuprofen may reduce your fever and the aches.

OTC decongestants containing pseudoephedrine can help dry and clear nasal passages, but usually only temporarily.

All US, over-the-counter (OTC) medicine labels have detailed usage and warning information so consumers can properly choose and use the products appropriately.

Halloween makeup: Use cosmetics that are intended for use on the face. Test makeup on a small area of skin (the arm) to check for sensitivity before applying it to the face. Avoid applying it around the eyes. Remove makeup before bedtime.

Halloween candy: Children should never eat Halloween candy until an adult has inspected it. Avoid letting your children eat unwrapped candy or homemade treats! When in doubt, throw it

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

Upshur approves grant for Meals on Wheels program

Upshur County Commissioners Court on Wednesday of last week approved a \$2,058 grant to the Meals on Wheels program, a move needed for the program to match funds from a state grant.

The court annually appropriates funds for the agency.

In other business, the court approved allowing county employees who voluntarily opt out of the county's health insurance program to continue receiving dental insurance coverage from the county government.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Frank Berka proposed the action, saying workers who move to Medicare save the county money. County Judge Todd Tefteller endorsed the proposal, saying "To me, that's a no-brainer."

In other action at the meeting at the Upshur County Courthouse in Gilmer, the court approved a resolution declaring October as "National Domestic Violence Awareness Month.'

Assistant District Attorney Catherine McQueen and Yecenia Vargas, crime victims coordinator for the district attorney's office, presented the court with statistics on the scope of the problem in the county. Vargas said there were 492 domestic violence cases last year, not including child abuse.

The court also approved a proclamation for "National 4-H Week" and recognized several 4-H members and adult volunteers for their achievements in the organization.

Adults Rick Poorman and his wife, Jennifer Poorman, were cited for being the 2019 Texas 4-H Salute to Excellence award winners in East District 5. County Extension Agent Kaitlyn Slover, who introduced them to the court, joined fellow Extension Agent Julie York in nominating them for the honor.

Also honored were 4-H members Maggie Mayes, Timothy Poorman and Jayden Taylor, a Harmony ISD student, for serving at the state level as "Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors."

"Their basic goal is to increase the health and wellness of our community," having been trained online, York told the court. Taylor will work with Harmony ISD to develop programs, while Poorman will work with the Red Cross and Mayes will work with York and the Gregg County extension office.
